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### News from the Edible Forest





New plants have arrived in the Edible Forest: three chokecherry selections (Johnson purple, Vining yellow, and a dwarf purple), three small chestnut trees, and a Mars seedless grapevine. Fruit production continues to increase as the plants come into production - top performers in 2024 included seedless and wine grapes, currants, and aronia berries. There was very promising development of peach, persimmon, pecan, and chestnut trees, and the mulberry tree produced its first good crop of berries. The overly wet spring resulted in some plant damage in the Edible Forest. The arctic beauty kiwis died, presumably due to extended saturated soil. The same condition resulted in poor growth of the raspberry plants and the blueberry plants in the sunken bed. Tours and demonstrations included grapevine pruning demonstration in May, public tours in June, July, and August, and five private tours including a group developing community orchards, a church group, and pre-K to 8th grade students. In addition, the Edible Forest was the main topic of the featured presentation at Gardening Saturday in Minot in April.

# **Japanese Garden Progress**

It was another productive summer for the Japanese garden!

We began the planting phase, with a few shrubs and ground cover as budget permitted. We submitted a grant proposal to the ND Forestry Service for additional shrubs and trees to be planted in summer of '25. All planting follows the plan created by garden designer Sadafumi Uchiyama. **We will need volunteers for planting, watering, mulching, etc., if you or your organization is interested.** 

We have also completed a zig-zag bridge, often found in Japanese Gardens.

Walk carefully and slowly on the bridge. Take time to pause and enjoy a new view at every turn as you walk among the irises. Turn off the noise, and maybe each new view is an opportunity for a better slant on life. Forget the nonsensical myth, that you lose the devil because he travels in straight lines. Just enjoy the bridge for what it is, and while you're there, appreciate the Japanesestyle wood joinery of mortise and tenon with no nails or metal connectors.

# **Garden Updates**

We have concluded another season with spectacular color displays throughout the garden. Our four paid gardeners, Lou, Gail, Don and Quin; assisted by volunteers Kim, Diana, Holly, Lisa, Cindy, Mary, Vern, Jim and Ruth watered, weeded, dead-headed, fertilized and replanted throughout the season to make this happen. This year both deer and a rampant rabbit population have been a challenge to even keeping plants available to bloom! Our gardens were further ravaged by the June flooding, requiring much replanting. The volunteer blue salvia seedlings — free plants! — were used to fill in our raised bed and bench garden near the greenhouse, and they looked beautiful through the entire growing season.

In addition to the regular garden maintenance, the crew developed and installed a secure donation box sign combined with a bulletin board and protective roof topped by succulent plants. The donation box was actually requested by some of our garden visitors and has proven to be a valuable addition. Later the group created a new circular Herb Garden that includes medicinal, culinary, and dye plants. A circular path was laid down inside the garden, with a center circle yet to be completed to include a possible bench and sundial. Laurie Somerville and Denise Quick helped with the design, selection of plants and planting. The Woodland Garden path was rebuilt thanks to grant support from the FM Area Foundation and the hard labor of Lou Worner, Don DuBord and Lisa Brown. Don DuBord also seeded a beautiful wildflower meadow on the hill of extra soil just north of the Japanese Garden, bringing to life an otherwise dreary hillside throughout the summer.



In September, the Fargo Park District notified NPBGS that the big red beach house near the greenhouse would be demolished. This required relocating our stored garden accessories and our two storage sheds. After much discussion the smaller shed was moved to the back of the greenhouse and the larger shed was relocated near the sand box area outside the mini golf course, with the help of Park District employees and equipment. Demolition of the beach house was done on October 17th.

We are sad to report that our contract gardeners Lou Worner and Gail Wanek will not return next year. Both Lou and Gail have done so much to make the gardens beautiful. Their garden knowledge, skills and creativity will be sorely missed. **Thank you, Lou and Gail, for your many years of dedicated work in the gardens.**
